For students planning to attend the dig for Lycoming College course credit, your application is due April 15th. Non-credit students' and volunteers' applications are due May 1st. If spaces are still available, volunteers are welcome to apply (and are encouraged to inquire) after May 1st, but must be prepared to make the appropriate payments immediately. All mailed documents must be received by May 22nd. After that date, everything must be submitted electronically.

Payment

Registration Fee

When you are informed of your acceptance to the dig, please send a non-refundable check for \$75 (or 71€) to the address provided for paper copies with your acceptance to hold your place on the dig.

Dig Fee

The cost to participate in the excavation is \$575 (or 558€) per week if you stay two to six weeks and \$2,700 (or 2721€) for experienced diggers who qualify to stay for seven weeks (beginning June 19). All fees must be postmarked by May 1st. Any payments submitted after that date must include a late fee of \$25 (or 20€) until May 10th and an additional \$25 (or 20€) for every week that the payment is late after that. All payments made after May 10th must be submitted directly, via wire transfer, rather than mailed.

Cancellations

If you cancel before June 1st a **full refund** will be given. If you cancel after June 1st, but before the season begins, a **50% refund** will be given. **No refund** will be given for participants who cancel after the dig season has started.

Dear Consulting Physician:

The Expedition to Idalion is an archaeological training program that takes place in Cyprus. Cyprus has a subtropical climate and, during the summer, the daytime temperatures range from 85° through 105° F. The participants will be expected to work in the field 7-8 hours a day, 2-3 hours at a time, avoiding the hottest part of the day between 11:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. The work involves a variety of activities including strenuous tasks like wheel barrowing, shoveling, picking, kneeling, and crouching, as well as lighter tasks such as brushing, drawing, and writing.

There is virtually no medical condition that would automatically disqualify an individual from participating and/or enjoying the experience. We need this information in order to anticipate problems and to safeguard fully the welfare of the participants.

There are excellent healthcare facilities available in the capital Nicosia, which is at the most one hour away from the site and our living quarters.

RELEASE FROM LIABILITY AND COVENANT NOT TO SUE

The undersigned, (hereafter called "Participant"), and LYCOMING COLLEGE EXPEDITION TO IDALION, CYPRUS, their employees, servants and agents (hereinafter called "Sponsors"), acting within their official capacity, agree as set forth below:

WHEREAS, Sponsors have a summer program, which includes the archaeological fieldwork at the site of ancient Idalion, primary processing of artifacts at the town of Dhali conducted by Lycoming College Expedition in the Nicosia District, and scheduled educational field trips, all in the Republic of Cyprus (hereinafter called "Field School"):

WHEREAS, employers of the sponsors will supervise scheduled activities of said Field School at the locations specified above; and

WHEREAS, the undersigned desires to participate, at the locations mentioned above, in the Field School which is a physically demanding activity in a foreign country,

NOW THEREFORE,

1. For and in consideration of being allowed to participate in the Field School outlined above, the undersigned does hereby release the Sponsors from any liability for death or bodily injury or damage to or loss of personal property incurred as a result of said participation in said Field School, including travel to and from the Field School survey areas, the archaeological site, or scheduled excursions in Cyprus, unless said death or bodily injury or damage to or loss of personal property occurs as a direct result of the acts or omissions of action by Sponsors.
2. The Participant expressly understands that any travel or activity away from the Field School survey areas or the site, unless expressly directed as a matter of business or as a part of the program, shall be the voluntary act and deed of Participant, and such travel or activity is not under the supervision or responsibility of Sponsors.
3. The Participant expressly understands that Sponsors shall not be responsible for any actions of the civil or criminal authorities of any foreign government resulting from the acts of the Participant.
4. The Participant and guardians of any underage Participant expressly understand that Sponsors shall not be responsible for the Participants as in loco parentis.
5. Further, the Participant agrees and covenants not to initiate, directly or indirectly, any claim, proceeding, action, lawsuit or any other legal proceeding of any kind against Sponsors, except for acts of gross negligence occasioned by or caused by Sponsors.
6. MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING FOR PARTICIPATION IN STUDY ABROAD: ASSUMPTION OF RISK

Lycoming College

1. Release from Liability: I release Lycoming College, its officers, employees, agents, and representatives from any and all claims and causes of action for loss of or damage to property, bodily or personal injury, loss of companionship or support, or death sustained by me or third parties arising out of any activity or travel conducted by or under the control of Lycoming College, unless the loss, injury, or death is caused by the negligence of Lycoming College.
2. Indemnification: I agree to indemnify and hold harmless Lycoming College, its officers, employees, agents, and representatives from any and all claims, demands, causes of action and all expenses incidental thereto (including reasonable attorney's fees), based upon or arising out of any personal injury (including death) or property damage or loss caused by or resulting from my acts or omissions during enrollment in this study abroad program.
3. Independent Travel: I understand that if I choose to travel independently during my free time, such travel will be unsupervised by Lycoming College, its agents, or employees. I agree that the College, its agents and employees shall have no responsibility or liability for any injury, damage, or loss suffered by me during such periods of independent travel.
4. Medical Treatment: I understand and acknowledge that there are inherent health risks associated with traveling abroad. I agree that I am personally responsible for obtaining all health information, instruction, immunizations, and medications appropriate to my intended travel. I recognize that the College is not responsible for any of my medical or medication needs and I assume all risk and responsibility therefore. I further agree that if I become incapacitated, the College, through its agents and employees, may take whatever action is deemed necessary with respect to my health and safety. I authorize the College, its agents and employees to place me, at their discretion and without my further consent, in a hospital or in the care of a local doctor for medical services and treatment. If necessary or desirable, I also authorize them to transport me back to the United States by commercial airline or otherwise for medical treatment. I agree that I, along with my parents or guardian, will be fully responsible for any and all expenses, including transportation costs, associated with or in any way related to my medical care.
5. Health Insurance: I certify that I will be covered by health insurance valid outside the United States and sufficient to cover medical expenses during my participation in the study abroad program.
6. Student Conduct: I will comply with the student conduct regulations of the host institution and/or study abroad program throughout the duration of my participation in the study abroad program. I agree that the Program Director shall have the right to enforce appropriate standards of behavior and that I may be dismissed from the program at any time for failure to comply with such standards.

9. Termination of Participation in the Program: I understand that if my participation in the program is terminated by the Program Director, I will be sent home with no refund of fees. If I am sent home before completion of the Program, or if I leave the Program voluntarily for any reason, I agree that I, along with my parents or guardian, will be responsible for any and all costs and expenses associated with my return home.

10. Assumption of Risk: I acknowledge that participation in the study abroad program “The 2015 Expedition to Idalion, Cyprus” involves risks that are beyond the control of Lycoming College. I understand that the social, cultural, political, religious, governmental, health care, legal (both civil and criminal) and other systems, as well as the geophysical characteristics of foreign countries may be different, in subtle and/or significant ways, from those in the United States. For example, behavior that might be illegal, or socially or culturally unacceptable or offensive in the United States may not be illegal and may be normal or acceptable in certain foreign countries; behavior that is considered normal or acceptable in the United States may be illegal or socially or culturally unacceptable or offensive outside the United States. In some countries political unrest and/or upheaval may be anticipated; police, fire and other governmental systems may be inadequate in certain countries; the quality and availability of health care may be very different than what is typically available in the United States; and different parts of the world are susceptible to different geophysical forces, including hurricanes, earthquakes, floods, tidal waves, tornadoes, volcanoes, and other natural disasters. I acknowledge that I have fully considered these and other risks of participation to our satisfaction. I also acknowledge that participation in this program is optional and that participation would not have been permitted without this release and agreement.

1. Travel Documents

You will need a passport that is valid through the date of your return to your home country. No other documents are required.

You might find an International Student Card and an International Driver's License useful if you plan to travel before or after the excavation.

2. Traveling to Idalion

By Air: You will need to fly to **Larnaca** International Airport (Paphos is too far away and Nicosia's airport is on the Turkish side of the city).

Dates: Work begins early on Monday, June 22nd and runs through the afternoon of Friday, August 7th. Field school students are expected to arrive on June 21st or earlier and must not leave the project before the afternoon of August 8th. Volunteers returning in July should book their return flights when they purchase their tickets, as flights during this peak travel period are *always* full and often overbooked.

Arriving in Cyprus: When you present your passport at Larnaca Airport Passport and Immigration Control, you will be asked the purpose of your visit to Cyprus, tell the officer that you are going to excavate in Dhali, (pronounced "Thahli": the 'th' is soft, like the 'th' in the word, "the") participating in an educational program in archaeology—the Expedition to Idalion, a non-profit project. Your passport will be stamped with a 60-day visitor's visa. There is no charge for this visa.



WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Getting to Idalion: Once you have gotten your passport stamped and have received your luggage, follow the signs to the taxi stand outside of the airport. Tell the dispatcher that you want to go to Pera Chorio (pronounced *pe'-ra hō'-ree-ō*). In Greek:

The dispatcher will point you towards a taxi. Be sure to ask him the fare and then confirm it with the driver before getting into the taxi. Tell the Taxi driver that you want to go to the Metamorphoseos Tou Sotiros (a large church, pronounced *me-ta-mor-fo'-see-os too' so-ti'-ros*) on the Old Limassol / Lemesos Road which is also B1.

The ride should cost about 30€ (depending on how much baggage you have) and should take 20 to 30 minutes. Most taxi drivers speak English. From there you will want to call Dr. Gaber's cell phone: 99-077057.

These directions are subject to change so be sure to monitor your e-mail for updates.



WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

3. Health

A recent (within the last ten years) inoculation against tetanus/diphtheria is absolutely essential and must be obtained before coming to Cyprus. Be sure that you have not had one in the past three years before re-inoculating yourself, as you could experience an adverse reaction.

Bring an adequate supply of any medications you take with you, as you may not be able to obtain your medication in Cyprus. Ask your physician if your medication predisposes you to sun sensitivity, heat stroke, or dehydration. Do not pack your medication in your checked luggage in case it is delayed or lost in transit. Luggage delays are frequent. Put your medication in your carryon bag.

As we will spend many hours in the sun, it is essential that you bring sufficient sunscreen with you. One tube may not be enough! Only the lower SPFs are available in Cyprus; they are also difficult to find and very expensive.

4. Insurance

Medical: Some standard medical insurance plans do not cover the full cost of medical care abroad. Check your health plan's coverage, and consider purchasing low-cost supplemental travel health insurance for the duration of your stay abroad.

Trip Cancellation: You should give serious consideration to purchasing trip cancellation insurance in the event that illness, accident, or a death in your immediate family prevent you from going on the excavation after you have paid for your airline ticket, or if something similar happens while you are on the excavation and are forced to return home early. Some airline tickets cannot be changed after issuance under any circumstances, and many only with a substantial penalty.

Supplemental insurance can be purchased through your travel agent, Blue Cross, the International Student Organization, or online through companies such as Seven Corners (www.sevencorners.com).



WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

5. What to Bring

It is absolutely **imperative** that each participant bring the following:

- small knapsack or bag to carry personal equipment into the field
- cotton hat for the sun, preferably wide-brimmed (you will not be allowed on the dig site without a hat)
- sunscreen (you will not be allowed on the dig site without sunscreen)
- sunglasses
- light long-sleeved shirt
- light short-sleeved/sleeveless shirts/tops and/or T-shirts
- light long pants
- light shorts
- sturdy closed shoes with minimal treads
- lots of socks
- light jacket or sweater (it does get cool at night and some mornings)
- sheets and pillowcase
- all of your usual medications in amounts sufficient for the duration of your stay
- flip-flops

You will also need:

- pencil case
- mechanical pencil with a supply of 2H (and 3H if available) leads
- eraser
- ball point pens
- small metric ruler and a small set square/triangle (available in art supply stores)
- sturdy, dependable wristwatch, preferably waterproof (non-waterproof watches will be affected by sweat)
- canteen, preferably insulated
- cotton bandanna or scarf
- cotton or light leather work gloves
- a presentable but casual light outfit for special outings such as town events, functions at CAARI, and the dig's farewell dinner
- ladies: sundresses are often comfortable and perfect for evenings and days off
- bathing suit and beach towel
- hand and bath towels, washcloth or plastic shower puff
- insect repellent and anti-itch product
- Band-Aids
- aspirin/Tylenol/Advil
- flashlight



WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Optional items include:

- camera and plenty of memory card storage space
- knee pads (available in hardware stores) or kneeling pad (available in garden supply stores). You may not sit during excavation; you must crouch or kneel. The dig has a supply, but they are thoroughly used.
- light-weight sleeping bag. The temperature may drop dramatically at night and many people sleep outside. Blankets are provided but bags are cozier.
- toiletries to last your full stay. Your favorite brands may not be available or may be too expensive.
- laptop computers are becoming increasingly popular for evening entertainment and viewing digital photos. If you are so inclined to bring one, be forewarned that you might not have an easily accessible power source, and that Cyprus gets very hot and can be very dusty. There are internet cafes available. Many coffee shops have wi-fi and we will likely have an internet connection where we live.

The clothes that you bring for field work should be capable of sustained abuse from physical activity, dirt, prickly vegetation, sun, and primitive washing conditions (i.e., by hand, by you, in cold water). Avoid clothing made from synthetic fibers not specifically designed for heat. Pack lightly with a thought to the hot climate! Summer dress in Cyprus is casual.

Power: Cyprus uses primarily type G plugs (right). The power itself is 240V, 50Hz. If you bring anything that needs to be plugged in you will need a converter for the outlet. Most electronics with a built in converter (like computers, iPod's, phones, etc.) are rated for up to 240V.



6. Personal Finances

You will need sufficient personal funds to cover incidental expenses while in transit to and from Cyprus and for your stay in Cyprus. Housing and workday meals are included in your Volunteer Fee. If you so desire, you will need to purchase juice, soft drinks, or alcoholic beverages during dig meals. Meals during field trips and days off are on your own. You may also wish to purchase snacks, cigarettes, souvenirs, gifts, postcards, a cell phone, taxi rides, et cetera. You can expect to spend \$600 – \$1,000 (US) for miscellaneous expenses.

Withdrawing money from local ATMs has become the most practical and cost effective way to get Euros for use during you stay in Cyprus (rather than relying on travelers checks or converting US or other currencies). Currency can be exchanged at a good rate in the Larnaca airport if need be. You should convert or withdrawal at least \$100 worth into Euros (80€) as soon as you arrive. If you arrive after normal business hours or on a Sunday, the banks at the airport will change U.S. dollar traveler's checks or cash only. Many other currencies, including Canadian, will not be accepted at these times. There are ATMs in Larnaca Airport.



WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

There are ATMs in Dhali and the surrounding area that are easily accessible. Note that not all cash machines accept all credit cards (e.g., for some reason, American MasterCard cards are problematic at most gas stations). Your credit card company may charge a hefty sum for cash withdrawals abroad—check fees before your departure. ATM card withdrawals, however, are only subject to the usual fees for withdrawals from a bank not your own. You should contact your bank and credit card company and inform them of your travels before departure; this will prevent your card(s) from being rejected due to suspicious charges.

N.B. Bank of Cyprus ATMs have classically charged little to no fees for withdrawals from outside accounts (over and above what your own bank may charge). Overall, it is in your best interest to withdrawal relatively large amounts of cash (200€, for example) at a time to minimize the number of times you will have to pay a fee.

7. Contact Information in Cyprus

The easiest way to keep in touch is to purchase a pre-paid cell phone in Cyprus. As of 2012, at the phone store in Dhali, you could purchase a phone and SIM card for as little as 45€. Calls made from these phones are relatively inexpensive and additional minutes can be purchased at any market.

Phone cards are not practical. The project has no landlines and payphones are scarce.

Using a North American phone overseas is incredibly expensive. Even with an international plan, most companies still charge roaming any time the phone is on.

Many students use Skype, or other internet-based methods of communication, to keep in touch with friends and family.

In case of emergency, a message can be left at the Cyprus American Archaeological Research Institute (CAARI) in Nicosia. Ask for the secretary, Vathoulla Moustoukki. We are in daily contact with CAARI, which has a fax machine.
